he waiting area at Peter Jacobsen Productions in Beaverton leaves little doubt about what drives the company and its founder.

The carpet between the two couches has two golf holes cut in it. Several golf balls are scattered about. A few putters learl against the reception counter.

Golf spawned the company and the long list of off-the-course activities that keep Jacobsen as busy as any golfer in the world.

Jacobsen, one of the most popular and well-known athletes Oregon has produced, is playing some of his best golf in years. Two weeks ago, he shot 12 under par and finished ninth at the Shell Houston Open, gaining his second consecutive top-10 finish and 76th in 27 seasons.

He had hip surgery to remove bone spurs in mid-2001. Now healthy, he is 85th on the money

list and even talking about getting a win against the youngsters before he turns 50 and moves on to the Champions Tour next

"I've been working really hard on my game, practicing a lot," Jacobsen said. "I'm just playing well."

But for Jacobsen, golf is not confined to inside the gallery ropes of the 618 PGA Tour events he has played in. His oncourse success - six tour wins, three international victories, three playoff losses, 76 top-10 finishes, two Ryder Cup appearances — are just part of the scorecard.

He also is a course architect, promoter, entertainer, arcade game icon, TV commentator and author.
